Having previously worked at the Aboriginal Health And Medical Research Council of NSW, Elizabeth also brings a deep knowledge of research ethics and the development of ethical consultation protocols.

Elizabeth is currently undertaking qualitative data collection at ARTD for the **Evaluation of the Indigenous Girls STEM Academy (NIAA)**. In her previous role at Ninti One, Elizabeth undertook qualitative and quantitative research and analysis for this joint ARTD - Ninti One project through desktop research and focus groups, interviews and surveys.

Elizabeth's other work on recent projects in roles prior to joining ARTD are outlined below.

- » Community Survey on Feral/Community Cats (Ninti One for Territory NRM): conducted qualitative and quantitative research and analysis through survey, engaged with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and stakeholders in a strengths based, culturally safe way that acknowledged local expertise and diversity across communities and participants.
- » Narratives of Recovery Practices Supporting Community Wellness and Resilience Post-Bushfires and COVID-19 (University of Wollongong): managed and provided operational support for this project, with involvement at each stage from planning and ethics applications, to supporting co-design, data collection, stakeholder and community engagement, report writing and translating research outcomes to accessible communications for public and communities.
- » Minga Goodjaga Mums and Bubs Program (Waminda South Coast Women's Health and Welfare Aboriginal Corporation): provided project and data administration, community, health provider and stakeholder consultation, and developed ethics and research protocols.
